THE FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME JESUS SPOKE WITH AUTHORITY

In today's Gospel, we learn that the people who were in the synagogue with Jesus noticed something different about Him. He spoke with *authority*.

That word contains the word *author*. When Jesus spoke, He spoke as the *author* of the Words, the *author* of the Truth, and people sensed that.

He didn't just *interpret* Scripture or tell nice stories, no, He spoke straight to the hearts of people as if He *understood* each and every one of them.

It touched them, it moved them, it transformed them.

That is what true authority is, it transforms.

THE PRESENTATION OF JESUS
IN THE TEMPLE

SIMON VOUET, 1590-1649

Friday, February 2 is the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, also known as Candlemas Day.

Simon Vouet was a French painter who today is best remembered for helping to introduce the Italian Baroque style of painting to France. He studied and rose to prominence in Italy, learning from Caravaggio, Veronese, and others. Returning to Paris, he and his studio of artists created religious and mythological paintings, portraits, and tapestries for King Louis XIII, and for wealthy patrons, including Cardinal Richelieu. He was considered the leading artist of his day in Paris, and it is said "in his time, the art of painting began to be practiced in a nobler and more beautiful way than ever before."

"The Presentation of Jesus in the Temple," shows the episode from Christ's childhood as related in St. Luke's Gospel for Friday, February 2, Luke 2:22-32.

As was customary, Joseph and Mary would have taken their first newborn male child on the 40th day of His birth to the Temple to present Him to the Lord and make the ritual sacrifice of a pair of turtledoves, or two young pigeons—thus the "presentation." You can see Joseph holding a basket with the birds ready to hand them over to the Priest.

God did not require of the Hebrews that they sacrifice their first-born children, "They shall be yours." But, the first-born was, by the standards of the times, God's. This is a wonderful way for us to appreciate how wise God is — to have a ritual for helping all parents understand that all human life is a gift from God.

Now Simeon and Anna arrive on the scene. They must have been two older people who loved God very much, who prayed very much, and who yearned for the Messiah. At their ages, they wouldn't be around thirty years later when Jesus began His public ministry. So, God gives them a special gift.

Luke describes Simeon as having been told he would not taste death until he had seen the Messiah. Simeon and Anna see Jesus and recognize Him. Their joy is exhuberant. Simeon asks Joseph and Mary if he may hold Jesus. They smile a "yes," and Mary hands Him over.

Simeon had waited a long time, but his patience was rewarded. Imagine the joy he must have felt when he finally held Jesus in his arms! As Simeon's arms cradle Jesus, the Holy Spirit gives him such beautiful words, "Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation which you prepared in sight of all the peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and glory for your people Israel."

But then the Spirit gives Simeon an additional prophecy of what being The One to bring God's Salvation will mean for Jesus and His parents. Looking at Mary he said "Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be contradicted – and you yourself a sword will pierce – so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed."

Our Artist opts for a pyramidal arrangement set against a colonnade suggesting the architecture of the Temple. The warmth of his palette glows in a golden light that emphasizes the lyrical harmony of the poses and the diagonal lines that dominate the composition.

The colors are all very vivid, but if you look carefully, in the lower third of the painting, barely visible in the center, in gray, you will see a sorrowful Mary.

CANDLEMAS

St. Simeon declared that Jesus would be a "light," and this constitutes the basis for why the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord is also called *Candlemas*.

Though not widely celebrated, Candlemas preserves a rich tradition for the Church. Historically, the Priest would bless all the candles used during Mass for the entire year. Many Catholics would bring candles to be blessed and to honor Christ as the "Light of the World."

Candles remind us that Christ is our light in the midst of darkness. When times are troubling, His presence shines the brightest.

Though not a holy day of obligation, it is a beautiful day in the Church's calendar, one that marks the official end of the Christmas season and looks forward to the light that will shatter all darkness at the Easter Vigil when another candlelight service is performed in recognition that, "the people who sit in darkness have seen a great light (Matthew 4:16).

LIGHTING A CANDLE

The act of lighting a candle when offering a special prayer has long been a cherished tradition.

When you light a candle for another person or for your own personal intention, always remember that the candle prolongs your prayer. As long as the candle is burning, your prayer is rising Heavenward to God. The candle is spreading light and warmth, so you can imagine that, your prayer, your love, and the love of God is flowing towards the person for whom you pray. Your prayer makes the life of the person brighter and warmer.

When you pray for a personal intention, light will enter the darkness; hope fills you. You may trust that God Himself looks upon you with His merciful love.

A candle radiates a gentle light. And, in the dim light of a candle you will look upon people and on your own life with gentleness.

FEAST OF ST. BLAISE BLESSING OF THROATS SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 3rd, 8:30 AM

We will have the traditional Blessing of Throats on Saturday, February 3rd at our 8:30 AM Mass.

St. Blaise's protection of those with throat troubles comes from a legend that a boy was brought to him who had a fishbone stuck in his throat. Blaise saved the boy's life by saying a prayer and blessing him with candles crossed at his throat.

"Through the intercession of St. Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from every disease of the throat and from every other illness. In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen."

+EUCHARISTIC ADORATION IN CHAPEL+ FIRST FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 2nd, 9-7 PM

"Could you not watch with me one hour?"

Matthew 26:40

Eucharistic Adoration is a practice and devotion wherein a consecrated host – Jesus Himself, body, blood, soul and divinity – is brought out of the tabernacle and placed in a monstrance, exposed for the faithful to see, adore, and pray before.

This practice finds its beginnings in the Garden of Gethsemane when Jesus asked His apostles, "Could you not watch with me one hour?" This is the very invitation of Eucharistic Adoration – to keep watch with Jesus for one hour.

Members of the Parish are asked to sign up to spend a quiet, holy hour of prayer keeping watch with Jesus.

One of the "rules" of Eucharistic Adoration is that the exposed Blessed Sacrament must never be left alone.

The last few months, this has not been the case, and more often than not, the Chapel has been found empty.

Sadly, it may prove necessary to reduce the time of Adoration on First Fridays to 9-11 AM when members of the faithful are present following our First Friday Mass.

Spending time with Jesus in Eucharistic Adoration deepens our relationship with Him, while He bestows grace upon us. Grace will flow from Him to you, to your family, and to the Parish.
