

THE SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT

A GLIMPSE OF GOD

Have you ever had a glimpse of God? Perhaps you perceived God's presence in a quiet moment of prayer, a tender conversation with a loved one, or a difficult situation that was resolved unexpectedly.

Peter, James, and John in today's Gospel were given a glimpse of Christ's glory on the mountain, as Jesus was transfigured before them.

Abraham put his faith in God and saw God's power in a wondrous sign of covenant love.

We have the promise of eternal life with God in Heaven. This promise brings with it responsibility, as people who are called to live as Christ's very own in the world.

Lent is the perfect time to resolve to listen more attentively to the Lord and follow God's ways, assured that in doing so, we put our faith in the one, true, and faithful God.

As we enter this Second Week of Lent, I ask not what you are giving up, but what are you giving? I challenge you to set spiritual goals for yourself to achieve during the coming weeks of Lent.

Please, use this sacred time to repent and reflect.

The sacrifice of Abraham, our father in faith (Genesis 22:1-2, 9a, 10-13, 15-18).

I walk before the Lord, in the land of the living (Psalm 116).

Second Reading

God did not spare His own Son (Romans 8:31b-34).

Gospel

This is my beloved Son (Mark 9:2-10).

THE TRANSFIGURATION AND LENT

The Feast of the Transfiguration is August 6th. And, although it may seem out of place on this Second Sunday of Lent, its position here gives us a chance to focus on the goal of our own Lenten journey.

The Transfiguration points us in the right direction as we journey to eternal life. We search out what we can do to improve ourselves and remain focused on our goals during Lent. The end of our journey is to share in eternal life with Jesus, where we, too, will have a glorified body. It is the final destination of our life journey.

As we reflect on the Transfiguration of Jesus, let us enter more deeply into the mystery it opens by choosing to live differently. Let us draw encouragement from the account of the Transfiguration of Jesus Christ. Let us respond to the invitations of grace in our daily lives in order to grow more fully into the image and likeness of Jesus Christ our Savior and Lord revealing His Transfigured glory to a world waiting to be born anew.

So, what is the Transfiguration doing here in Lent? Let's just say that, as it was for the disciples who saw it before they witnessed all the events of Christ's passion and death, it's a sign of hope. A hope for the future that can transform, or *transfigure* our own lives even now.

It's also a reminder for us of the goal of our Lenten journey. Our Lenten observance is an invitation into an ongoing transformation in Jesus Christ. It is not meant to be drudgery but *opportunity* for those with eyes to see Jesus on that mountain.

We are all invited to join with Peter, James, and John and cry out with them, "It is good for us to be here!"

Wherever we are on our journey, it is truly good for us to be here!

OUR COVER ARTWORK THE TRANSFIGURATION CARL BLOCH (1834-1890)

Carl Bloch was a Danish painter who lived for 7 years in Rome and was highly influenced by the classical art surrounding him. He painted highly religious subjects in a very realistic and lyrical style. He is most famous for his commission to produce 23 paintings for the King's Chapel at the Frederiksborg Palace in Denmark. These were all scenes from the life of Christ. Our painting today is from that series.

All figures, including Moses and Elijah, have their backs to us. Only Christ, in blinding light, faces us directly. Painting Christ, Moses, and Elijah in white, does not just convey the bright light, but also makes the figures seem almost ethereal.

Peter, James, and John in the foreground, despite the light, are in awe, and look quite amazed by what they see.

Today's Gospel is from Mark, but in St. Luke's account of this miracle (Luke 9:28-36) a phrase that stands out is the passage that starts with the words "Jesus took Peter, John, and James, and went up to the mountain to pray."

Jesus prayed quite a bit, as we know. And, we can join Jesus in His prayer, so that we, too, can be changed or *transfigured*. A prayer like the Rosary, for example.

In 2002, Pope John Paul II added the Luminous Mysteries to the Rosary. The Transfiguration is one of them – the moment when Jesus revealed Himself as God's Son. "The Gospel scene of Christ's transfiguration, in which the three Apostles Peter, James and John appear entranced by the **beauty** of the Redeemer, can be seen as an icon of Christian contemplation" wrote John Paul II in the apostolic letter Rosarium Virginis Mariae.

John Paul II uses the word *beauty* as a key quality to get us into the mystery of our faith ... a beauty we can find in some of the art we look at, such as the painting here.

dear Padre

I know "formal" prayers like the Our Father and Hail Mary are important, but do my "informal" prayers count?

On the level of the spiritual life, prayer is as basic as breathing is to physical life. Everyone at every moment has the grace to say a prayer.

Sometimes, I ask people, "Do you pray?" Sometimes they tell me they don't. Then, I ask them, "Well, do you talk with God?" Of course they do, at least sometimes.

That's praying. Prayer is the raising of the mind and heart to God. I'm sure your prayers will be that in word and feeling, and they will "count."

It's nice to include the prayer elements the Church considers important – Adoration of God, contrition, and being sorry for sin, thanksgiving for life and for God's care of us in good times and bad, and petition for what we desperately need in our poverty.

A final word. Remember that, no matter how bad things may get, no matter how out of control, you always have the gift and power of saying a prayer. And, you may always ask Mary, your Mother in Heaven, to pray with you.

A MORNING PRAYER

I bow before you in adoration, O my God. I arise to sing of my love for you. I absorb the light of this new day and soak up the love that ceaselessly flows out of your divine heart. With gratitude for the wonder of this day, for the rich gift of life itself, I enter into silent prayer.

Grant me the grace to look with respect upon all I will meet this day and upon every event I encounter. Mindful that I am a pilgrim, may I treat each and every one with reverence and love, as a manifestation of you to whom I journey.

May the work of my hands – and even the trials I experience – be part of the redemption of the world and its eternal liberation.

I dedicate this day to you and I begin it in a holy way in your Holy Name and in the name of your Son, Jesus, and in the name of the Holy Spirit. *Amen*.

AN EVENING PRAYER

Loving God of all creation, I thank you for the countless blessings of this day – gifts of sight, sound, touch, and smell, for wonders without end. I thank you, as well, for your endless patience with me and your pardon of my failings.

Awaken my heart to journey inward to you, the source of my life and love. May your Spirit lead me into prayer, as I now enter the innermost chamber of my heart.

I surrender myself to your safekeeping as night draws close to me. Bless with your presence those I love. Come and be with me in a sleep that will refresh me for a new day and for the work it holds for me.

Grant comfort to all who face the darkness of this night with fear. Give shelter to those without a home and give peace to all. *Amen.*

Now that Lent is here, why not consider waking up a little earlier and coming to one of our Daily Masses, weekdays at 6:45 AM and 8:30 AM.

Please read this excerpt from *Rediscovering Catholicism* by Matthew Kelly and discover what a truly wonderful way it is to start your day!

"I would walk into the Church and it would be just me, the Priest, and about ten other men and women. It was quiet, peaceful, and intimate. It was there, in that Daily Mass experience, that I fell in love with the Mass and the Church.

By some grace, I started to listen to the prayers of the Mass, really listen ... and it was like the pieces of a puzzle coming together to form an incredible vision.

I would follow the opening prayer, the readings, and the closing prayer in my missal, and the words began to enter my heart and ignite the fire in my soul.

There is genius and beauty in the prayers of the Mass and yet most people tune out the prayers. There is great beauty in these prayers, but too often we don't hear them because we are distracted by our thoughts or by those around us. Some of the prayers are the same for every Mass. Others change with the seasons of the Church calendar. And still others change every day.

If you take time to listen and truly pray these prayers as the Priest says them, you will discover the intimate knowledge the Church has of our spiritual needs.

It was at these quiet and intimate Daily Mass experiences that this sacred ritual really began to ignite my love for Catholicism."
