FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT

LAETARE SUNDAY

A little light breaks into Lent this Sunday, and the Church can hardly contain its joy!

Laetare is a Latin word that means *"rejoice."* This Fourth Sunday of Lent is called *Laetare Sunday*, when the Church takes a bit of a breather from Lenten practice and opens Mass with the Entrance Antiphon, *"Rejoice, Jerusalem … Be joyful, all who were in mourning!"* (Isaiah 66)

Today, we look with joyful anticipation to the great Solemnity of Easter for which we have been preparing ourselves as a Church during the Lenten season. It is a day intended to encourage the faithful through the remaining days of penance.

There are special signs of joy permitted on this day – you may see flowers on the Altar, and the Priest may wear rose colored vestments instead of the Lenten purple penitential ones. The contrast between Laetare Sunday and other Sundays is thus emphasized.

In previous centuries, as a symbol of this joy, the Pope would carry a golden rose in his right hand when leaving Mass. Later, the golden rose consisted of a cluster of roses made of pure gold that the Popes would bless and then give to cities, churches, or shrines as a memento.

Be joyful!! This is a day to rejoice!!

Joyful, joyful, we adore Thee, God of glory, Lord of love; Hearts unfold like flow'rs before Thee, Op'ning to the sun above. Melt the clouds of sin and sadness; Drive the dark of doubt away; Giver of immortal gladness, Fill us with the light of day!

A GENEROUS HEART

There are three Christian practices called for in Lent – prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, or acts of charity.

The Lord commanded us to care for the poor and needy, not just collectively, but individually. This is your charge and obligation, especially during Lent.

You may believe that giving is something for the wealthy to do, but no matter your financial circumstances, you have so much to give.

A generous heart can be fostered with simple acts of generosity and kindness. Offer others your smile, best wishes, encouragement, enthusiasm, understanding, forgiveness, warmth, comfort, attention, help, wisdom, time, and yes, even your worldly possessions if you are so inclined. There are countless ways to walk your path of life with a generous heart!

As you commit to obey this commandment, your desire to give will fill your heart and overflow into your actions. To be gentle, warm, understanding and compassionate to others, forgiving of their mistakes, patient with their shortcomings and sympathetic to their plight is to offer grace and care for our fellow man.

Along with your commitment to give, this is a good opportunity to check your heart. Here are three simple suggestions to ensure your Christ-like hands are moved by a Christ-like heart.

1. Love those you serve. Look into their eyes and see them as the Children of God that they are.

2. Learn from them. Do not view yourself as a superior benefactor but as an equal, struggling mortal. Recognize that your life may have turned out very differently. *There, but for the grace of God, go !!!*

3. Pray for them, sincerely. Prayer is a principle of action and power. God will guide your actions and give you the power to carry out His plans.

When you have a loving, giving, and generous heart, you will give with pure motives. You won't give to ease *your* conscience, but to ease *their* suffering. And God will embrace and thank you for the way you kindly cared for His children.

ALMSGIVING DURING LENT

"Each one must do as he has made up his mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver" 2 Corinthians 9:7.

During Lent, we are asked to focus more intently on *"almsgiving,"* which means donating money or goods, and performing other acts of charity. Almsgiving is not the tithing you are already doing – it's giving *above and beyond* what you normally give or do. It is a true penance.

When defining almsgiving, it helps to understand the meaning behind the word itself. The roots of the word *"alms"* can be found in ancient Latin and Greek words meaning mercy and pity. Similarly, the root of the word *"charity"* comes from the Latin *"caritas,"* meaning love. Charity is essential to our Christian faith, as charity is basically an act of love.

A critical component of Christ's teachings is to love one another as God loves us. By caring for others and sharing your blessings with them, you are participating in the work of Christ on earth.

The widow with the two coins from Luke's Gospel is a wonderful example of almsgiving, even when we feel we have little or nothing to give.

Or the miracle of the Loaves and Fishes – this one carries **two** important messages. First, no matter how little we have, we always have enough to share. Second, Christ can take our humble gifts and do great things with them if we are just willing to let Him. No gift is too small or insignificant.

Look for ways to incorporate some of the following almsgiving examples into your Lenten practice ...

*Donate food to your neighborhood food pantry.

*Grocery shop or run an errand for an elderly neighbor.

*Make a meal for a new mother or elderly neighbor.

*Show an act of kindness to someone who may be difficult to get along with.


*Support the work of the Church around the world by giving to organizations that serve impoverished populations.

"YOUR ALMSGIVING MUST BE SECRET"

Charity is essential to our faith, as charity is basically an act of love. If we were to do acts of charity and want to be seen doing them, we would come at it from an attitude of superiority where we would give something to someone who we would consider as inferior. This, of course, can't be right. So charity work needs to be an act of humility, done in love for the other person... and therefore in love for Our Lord.

Jesus said to His disciples: "Be careful not to parade your good deeds before men to attract their notice; by doing this you will lose all reward from your Father in Heaven. So when you give alms, do not have it trumpeted before you; this is what the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets to win men's admiration. I tell you solemnly, they have had their reward. But when you give alms, your left hand must not know what your right is doing; your almsgiving must be secret, and your Father who sees all that is done in secret will reward you."

Matthew 6: 1-4.
