

# EASTER SUNDAY OF THE RESURRECTION OF THE LORD

### **ALLELUIA!**

For the 40 days of Lent, the word "Alleluia" has been gone from the liturgy of the Church. It is never said – not even once!

Then, during the Easter Vigil, the Priest intones the great *Alleluia* and it seems like the Church can't stop repeating this word over and over again. Why is that?

Easter is a period of great joy and exultation, and singing *Alleluia* is the Church's way to highlight this reality, continually giving praise and honor to God.

Alleluia (sometimes written "Hallelujah") is rooted in a Hebrew expression that means "Praise the Lord." It is found most often as a type of antiphon that is repeated at the end of the Psalms. It is also found in the Book of Tobit, where it is referenced as a hymn of praise to be sung in the new Jerusalem. "The gates of Jerusalem shall be built of sapphire, and of emerald, and all the walls thereof round about of precious stones. All its streets shall be paved with white and clean stones: and Alleluia shall be sung in its streets."

It is also found in the Book of Revelation ... "and as the voice of great thunders, saying, Alleluia: for the Lord our God the Almighty hath reigned. Let us be glad and rejoice, and give glory to Him; for the marriage of the Lamb is come, and His wife hath prepared herself."

It is, and always has been, an expression of praise, glorifying God for His goodness.

It is often said that Christians are an "Easter People." We walk in the sure and certain hope that just as Jesus rose from the dead to sit at the Father's right hand, we, too, have Jesus' promise that all who believe in Him will have everlasting life.

Our response to this promise – this gift – is to worship God with praise and thanks for what He has already done for us through Jesus Christ.

But, there is more to it than that.

Beyond our thanks and praise, Jesus calls us to a different kind of life – a different way of living.

As an "Easter People," our response to the gift of forgiveness and eternal life compels us to try to live lives that reflect our new status. We are a people forgiven, healed, and renewed by Jesus' Body and Blood, and we are called to share that Good News with the whole world.

Our response can and should be rooted in love. As Jesus Himself has told us, love for God and love for our neighbor is the foundation of Christian living. Because God first loved us, loved us so much that we were given His Only Son for our salvation, our response to this love is not only to love God as deeply and fully as we are able, but also to love everyone else as deeply and fully as we love ourselves.

If we could begin to respect one another as equally loved, equally forgiven, equally saved by God through Christ Jesus, we could begin to live the second of Jesus' Great Commandments, "to love thy neighbor as thyself" with greater success. This is what it truly means to be an "Easter People."

This Easter, amidst the joy and celebration of our new lives in Christ, let us all strive to become an "Easter People" and celebrate the joy of new life with others.



Only God could have created all the loveliness of Spring.

Made the bough to bud and blossom, taught the robin how to sing.

Only God could have remembered through the winter, cold and gray, how to renew the earth with beauty and give us this Easter Day.

Joy to the world!
The Lord is come!

Did you know that one of our beloved Christmas carols, was not written as a Christmas carol?

The song is so familiar to us, and its words are so well known, that you probably have never noticed that it does not include a single detail about Jesus' birth. There's no mention of a stable, no shepherds, no wise men, no Mary or Joseph, no little town of Bethlehem or choirs of angels or silent nights. That's because it's not based on the Christmas stories in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke.

Instead, it was written based on three verses from one of King David's most meaningful psalms, Psalm 98.

The author, Isaac Watts, was one of the greatest hymn writers in Church history. In 1719, he wrote a book of poems in which each poem was based on a psalm in his quest to point all of the psalms specifically to Jesus. One of those poems was an adaptation of Psalm 98. Watts interpreted this psalm as a celebration of Jesus' role as King.

Psalm 98:4-6 reads:

"Make a joyful noise unto the Lord, all the earth: make a loud noise, and rejoice, and sing praise. Sing praise to the Lord with the harp, with the harp and melodious song. With trumpets and the sound of the horn, sing joyfully before the King, the Lord."

As you can see, the theme of the above verse is "joy." The words "joy" and "rejoice" appear three times. King David and Watts had the same idea – that all of the earth should make a joyful noise unto the Lord.

If there were ever a day for us to celebrate the arrival of Jesus as King, it is Easter Sunday. After all hope seemed to have been lost on Good Friday, and after a quiet day of somber reflection on Holy Saturday, Christians around the world will celebrate with great wonder – the Resurrection of Jesus from the dead. Who else would we claim as our King?

Joy to the world! The Lord is come.

Let earth receive her King.

Let every heart prepare Him room,

And Heaven and nature sing,

And Heaven and nature sing,

And Heaven, and Heaven and nature sing.

Joy to the world! The Savior reigns.

Let us our songs employ.

While fields and floods, rocks, hills and plains

Repeat the sounding joy,

Repeat the sounding joy,

### THE EASTER LILY

On Easter Sunday morning, Churches will be filled with floral arrangements of these beautiful white flowers *Lilium Longiflorum*, also known as White Heaven, the Trumpet Lily, or the Easter Lily. For many, the beautiful white flowers of the Easter Lily symbolize purity, virtue, innocence, hope and life – the spiritual essence of Easter.

It is hard to deny the beauty and majesty of these elegant flowers with their fragrant, pure white, trumpet-shaped blossoms. The shape of the Easter Lily does indeed resemble a trumpet that could be sounding the message that Jesus has risen, commemorating the Resurrection of Jesus Christ and our hope of life everlasting.
